Rector's Message

Advent, at least as far as newsletter submissions go, is that wonderful time of year when your pastor typically warns against the glitz and glamor of consumerism obscuring the mystery, along with some rant about how early it seems that secular Christmas has encroached into other seasons. I'd be inclined to do the same, but then how would I explain my enjoyment of Freeport's Mistletoe Walk this past Sunday, or the fact that at said event I was standing in line in my clericals with my daughter to see Santa Claus *before* Thanksgiving? Then of course there is the bashful admission that some dormant part of my childhood awe and wonder nearly compelled me to cut in front of my daughter, leap into Santa's lap, and cry out like Ralphie in *A Christmas Story*, "I want a battery-operated Milwaukee M18 Sawzall reciprocating saw!" You'll cut your fingers off kid?

Like many people, I do not appreciate being hurled into yuletide joy before I am good and ready. Thanksgiving is special to me and I like to have my turkey and eat it too. Then I like to nap.

But there is something beautiful, I think, in having slightly blurred lines between the hallmark dates of the all-encompassing Holiday Season, that time from Thanksgiving to the New Year. It just requires a different lens. A liturgical lens. Thanksgiving for example, while not part of the liturgical calendar *per se*, is a wonderfully appropriate lead-in to our season of Advent. It is a date set aside for intentionally giving thanks for all the blessings of this life, no matter how small or seemingly insignificant. This, of course, is something we practice in the church every Sunday with the Eucharist, which comes from the Greek noun *eucharistia*, meaning "thanksgiving."

Out of thanksgiving naturally flows gratitude. "Gratitude," Br. David Vyrhof of the Society of St. John the Evangelist says, "springs from the awareness that we have been given a gift . . . This awareness can rise in us suddenly and unexpectedly, but it can

also be *cultivated*. We can *develop* our awareness, and learn to *practice* gratitude.” Vyrhof goes on to say that “Gratitude moves beyond the recognition of the gift to the recognition of the giver,” and gratitude expressed is part of the entire process, the process of building relationship.

The season of Advent is the time in our liturgical calendar when we prepare our hearts and minds to receive the greatest gift of all, Jesus, the Messiah. Born of a woman and made truly human, Jesus is God’s gift to the world, sent to rebuild our relationship with God, to reconcile us to the one who created us. Our preparation in the weeks to come for the arrival of the Christ child is about making room in our hearts with gratitude for this amazing gift.

Since gratitude, as Br. Vyrhof observed, is something that can be cultivated and practiced, I invite you to form a practice this Advent with gratitude as your foundation. In our Christian Formation classes, we will be discussing small experiments, those little practices we try to instill into our daily living to make room for God. Along with this, I invite all of you to pick up a copy of *Living Compass’* Advent devotional, which this year is focused on generosity, a discipline born out of gratitude. Just using this small resource booklet could very well be your small experiment.

While I do not wish to use this space to gripe about our cultural wars around the Holiday Season, it is true that this time of year gets hectic with travel plans, meals, and gift giving. Even the simple conversation of whether or not to get each other gifts or to get a larger gift for both to enjoy, and then trying to decipher if your partner really meant they did not want you to get them a gift or was there a subtext you may have missed, is immensely stressful. How does one even find the time to devote to fretting about when or where Christmas music was being played (Bing, all day everyday if I had my druthers)?

However, when we intentionally delve into Advent, this liturgical space carved out to just be with God, all those other concerns take their rightful place in the not-worth-getting-worked-up-about pile. I hope you have a wonderful and prayerful Advent, and I hope that you are able to cultivate some practice into your days to prepare him room with a grateful heart.

Notes from Grace's Greens:

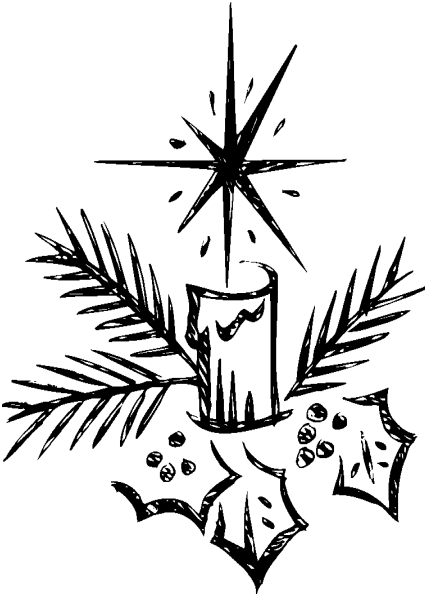

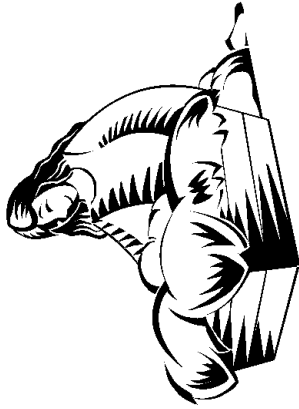
