Rector's Message

Spring has sprung...or so my calendar tells me. However, some of my perennials started coming up in late February, and the kids and I built a snowman in mid-March, so you can understand my confusion. Frankly, with how sporadically temperatures and snow availability changed, leaving me unable to partake in my usual outdoor seasonal recreation, I am not all that convinced winter ever came.

Anyway, I am a lover of all seasons, and the coming of spring is particularly awe-inspiring as new life begins to peek through the soil or inhabit the trees and wild places all around us. There are new smells, new sounds, and new sights all drawing our attention to a palpable sense of hopeful expectation as the Earth prepares to burst forth with new life.

It is a fitting backdrop for this time when we, as a people of faith, are also preparing ourselves with hopeful expectation for the celebration of new life in Jesus Christ through that ultimate triumph of life over death: the Resurrection. Holy Week, which may very well be underway as you read this, brings us through the darkness and agony of Christ's passion on the cross, and delivers us safely to the other side, where death has been vanquished and the promise of life everlasting becomes real.

In my experience, the new life, or redemption, promised to us by Christ's own Resurrection is not solely reserved for that time in which our mortal bodies cease to sustain life and we die.

Resurrection, redemption, new life are realities that we can experience many times over again in our lifetime in a myriad of ways. Our behaviors, worldviews, vocations, and even our faith can all undergo a death and resurrection to new life as we strive to become who God wants us to be.

In the spirit of new life, I would like to talk once again about the side ministry I have been working on for the past few years, Rebuilding Together Stephenson County, whose mission is to refurbish homes for those financially or physically unable to make necessary repairs themselves. The repairs are meant to make the homes safer, weatherized, and more aesthetically pleasing to the community, bringing new life to both the structure and the homeowner.

With all this new life beginning to blossom around us, so too a new building season is about to begin for Rebuilding Together. Last year we constructed a new porch, put in new windows and doors, landscaped, and painted an entire house. Also, with available grant money, we paid to have a handicap ramp installed on a second home. When we presented RTSC to the monthly gathering of Social Service Agencies in March, some of the other agency representatives were overjoyed because they had been unsuccessful in getting a ramp for that same client. Their reaction was worth all that we have put into getting this ministry off the ground over the last three years, and they weren't even the ones benefitting from the ramp!

As we head into this next building season, a couple of houses have already been selected and applications continue to come in. We have even received one from a veteran who qualifies for a substantial grant RTSC received from USAA specifically for the refurbishment of homes owned by veterans. We are, however, still a relatively small force. I would like to finally officially invite all our Grace Family to join me in this ministry as it goes into its second building season, so that this very necessary ministry can continue to grow and thrive. There are several ways to get involved, including volunteering on builds, providing meals for work crews, financial and/or tool donations, and even membership on the Rebuilding Together Stephenson County board of directors.

Treasurer's Report

Below is a comparison of the first 2 months of 2023 financial results compared to 2022.

The total revenue for the first two months of 2023 was \$22,506 more that what we received in the first two months of 2022. The total amount of 2023 pledges received in the first two months was \$73,694 which is 45% of the total amount pledged for the year. Having this large amount of pledges paid this early in the year helps alleviate any cash flow problems that we may have later in the year.

You will notice that the amount paid for Buildings & Grounds was \$10,376 more that what was paid in 2022. In January we paid \$7,000 for the first six months insurance premiums for this year. Last year that payment was made in December. It is simply a timing issue. Also we needed to pay \$1,990 to replace the refrigerator in the rectory. Our All Other Expense line item is higher because the church gave \$2,000 to FACC for their transportation program. This is considered a Community Outreach expense.

We are off to a good start this year financially thanks to the generosity of our parishioners and their concern for the church.
