## Rector's Corner

It is that time of year when the Pralls take to the open road, or as open as IDOT and INDOT allow it to be. The I-80/90/94 corridor between states has been perpetually under construction for as long as I can remember. Ohio, Pennsylvania, and New York are usually not so bad, though.

Anyway, there are three of my allotted five Sundays for which I plan to be absent over the next month. The first will be July 14<sup>th</sup>, as we will be making a mad weekend dash to Cleveland and back to see our friends' new baby. Then we will be heading back out on our annual New York vacation from July 22<sup>nd</sup> to August 7<sup>th</sup>, which means I will be absent for services on July 28<sup>th</sup> and August 4<sup>th</sup>.

An issue that arises every year is how to cover these services when there is an extreme shortage of supply clergy, especially out here in the Rockford Deanery. We have been blessed to be able to handle the situation in-house, with our own parishioners graciously leading Morning Prayer or Liturgy of the Word. However, there are folks for whom it is not church without Holy Communion. I have probably already shared the story with you about how we lost a parishioner one Sunday when I was a young lay leader in Sterling tapped to lead Morning Prayer; and by "lost," I mean we had no idea where he went. He showed up to church, saw it was Morning Prayer, and promptly walked out

to go to the nearby Catholic Church for Communion, without telling his wife. She panicked, because he had some health issues, and called the police to search for him. It was a whole thing.

During Bishop Clark's visit, these challenges were the subject of conversation at a couple of tables. I sat at a table with the Chaplain to the Bishop, who explained that the Diocese's preferred worship in the absence of clergy is Morning Prayer. It is part of our heritage, as Anglicans, as well as our theology for what it means to be gathered together in *common prayer*, i.e., there is more to our church life than the bread and the cup.

These conversations left enough of an impression on Bishop Clark that she sent a letter to the Diocese to provide "clarification on Eucharist, Morning Prayer, and Lay Eucharistic Ministers." As is my Canonical duty to share communications from the Bishop with you, I will post the letter outside the kitchen for you to read at your leisure (or I can email you a copy upon request), but allow me to share a few excerpts that convey the overall message:

As you know, we are in a season in our diocese when many congregations are not able to have a priest present to celebrate the Eucharist every Sunday. While the Eucharist is a beloved sacrament, the core of our worship is coming together in community to pray.

In congregations where there is no priest -- either occasionally or regularly -- Morning Prayer should be read. Morning Prayer may be led by anyone in the congregation, and it can be a wonderful opportunity for lay leaders and deacons to take the lead in worship. Around our diocese we have several lay-led congregations that are worshiping in this way...

While many of us have come to think of the Celebration of Eucharist as a part of our Sunday worship or piety, I encourage you to remember the prayer of St. John Chrysostom:

"...you have promised through your well-beloved Son that when two or three are gathered together in his Name you will be in the midst of them..."

The worship of the Church is rooted in community and praising God, in whatever shape that takes. This is an exciting time to renew and raise up deacons and lay leaders, and learn how to be Church together in a new way.

Having shared that, I am pleased to say that I did receive a very gracious offer for supply, but I will hang on to that until I can properly make the arrangements. It may not be for all the Sundays I am away, so I might still lean on our wonderful lay leaders to fill in with Morning Prayer. As always, I appreciate their willingness to do so, and I appreciate your willingness to worship in the fullness of our Anglican tradition so that I can take some restorative time off.

Below is an analysis comparing the actual results for the first five months of this year to the annual budget.

The first 5 months is 42% of the year, so this chart compares the actual revenue and expenses to 42% of the annual budget. Of course our pledges are not paid evenly throughout the year and some expenses are seasonal so 42% is just a target to help us see how we are proceeding throughout the year.
