Rector's Message

Greetings and blessings to you all during this season of Advent!

The word *advent*, as you no doubt know, simply means the arrival of a notable person, thing, or event. In the Church, it is the season in which we hold *two* such arrivals close in our hearts and minds: the arrival of the Christ child – the first advent – *and* the arrival of "the Son of Man coming in a cloud" – Christ at his second advent. We simultaneously anticipate the *already* (baby Jesus) as we look with hopeful expectation to the *not yet* (Jesus coming again in glory).

If that seems confusing, that is okay. It certainly isn't as confusing as half the town putting up Christmas decorations before Thanksgiving. People seem to have been unsure what to celebrate when or why, so they figured, where is the harm in having an inflatable Santa and a Turkey occupy the front lawn at the same time?

With the season of Advent comes a spirit of new beginnings. A new liturgical year begins (Year C). We prepare to participate once again in the story of our salvation from the beginning, as the Gospel narrative starts over. And beloved traditions within the Church and home are enjoyed once again, offering us an opportunity for a sense of renewal.

Personally, my ministry will be experiencing a new beginning of sorts...or it has? I don't know. I am not sure if I am in the *already* or the *not yet*, but I have been appointed by the bishop as the new Dean of the Rockford Deanery. A fine start I am off to since I don't know if that is official now or at the end of the calendar year.

At any rate, for those unfamiliar with the Episco-lingo, a deanery is a geographical region within a diocese. Our diocese, the Diocese of Chicago, is nearly the top northern half of the state of Illinois, and the Rockford Deanery extends as wide as Galena to DeKalb/Sycamore, and as long as Route 20 down to just south of Interstate 80 in the Illinois Valley. According to the National Church's glossary of terms,

The dean of a deanery is a priest, usually rector of one of the deanery parishes, who is elected or appointed to oversee the work of the deanery. The dean is responsible for convening the clergy and at times the lay representatives of the congregations of the deanery. Clergy who serve as deans use the title "The Very Reverend." They may wear a distinctive piping (colored trim) on the cassock.

I have no plans to add piping to my cassock; it was my grandfather's, and I only really wear it when I get cold while writing in the Rector's Study. I cannot tell you where the distinction of "Very Reverend" comes from or why, just that apparently whatever I was before, now I must be very...that.

It is an honor to be considered for the role, though there is no special liturgical laying on of hands or knighting ceremony involved. In fact, I think it really means I get to attend more meetings: meetings with the other deans in the diocese, meetings with the other clergy and lay leaders within our deanery. One practice that is relatively new for us is that the dean handles celebrations of new ministry, whereas once upon

a time the bishop came out to "install" the new rector of a parish. There are several parishes in the Rockford Deanery in transition right now, so that might be something I will be doing a lot of in the near future, but time will tell.

I hope you have a very blessed Advent. May you take time for yourself during this busy season to just sit and be with God. Savor the holy anticipation of what was, and what is to come: Our Lord Jesus Christ.
